Key Training Sections from the New Tools

Teacher's Room - Student Kit

Not only great resources to help teachers use the student kit but also very useful advice for all educators (and other front-line workers, counsellors etc.) on how the impacts of violence can play out in the classroom and how to support learning for all.

Caveats and Suggestions for Using the Student Kit in the Classroom

Included in the Teacher's Room, this document offers wise guidance on using the student kit from a teacher who used it in an intensive ten-session course.

Learning in the Classroom - College Tool

This section of the college tool will help educators to explore the issue as it is related to the work they do in their classrooms. It offers resources, challenges misconceptions and provides suggestions for educators to support equity in their classrooms, to engage in curriculum development, and to better understand and address student behavior and learning.

Learning in a Community-based Environment- Community-based Guide

This section of the community tool will help practitioners and programs reflect on the different phases of a learner's journey through a community-based literacy program, from first impressions to working in groups or with a tutor, to transitioning on. Voices and strategies of practitioners are offered as well as questions for reflection on these key junctures as well as on curriculum, evaluation and assessment.

Workshop Plans

Workshop plans for professional development sessions designed to be used within one organization and at conferences.

Introduction to the College Tool and Student Kit

A 3-hour workshop plan designed for college staff in all roles. The plan includes using Webquests to introduce the 2 resources in pairs at computers.

Using the College Tool

A 3-hour workshop plan designed for college instructors to help them begin to use the Learning in the Classroom section of the College Tool to make changes to individual and department practices. Participants work together to develop ideas for action during this workshop.

Introduction to the College Tool (Without Computers)

When we don't have the luxury of a full set of computers for participants to explore the college tool we can still introduce it. Ideally we will use a LCD projector and one computer to show the interactive version of the kit. But if this is not available the full PDF can be printed out and a print based version of the tool can be introduced instead. This workshop plan gives some ideas for how to get participants to begin to think about the issue and this tool.

Rethinking Learning/Teaching: Groundbreaking Tools for Colleges and Community Programs *(Coming soon)*

Workshop plans designed for conference participants to introduce the 2 practitioner tools and provide participants with an opportunity to discuss how aspects of their educational provision might have profound impacts on students, affecting attendance, behaviour, attitudes and participation levels.

Everyone Can Learn: Tools for Students Who Think They Can't *(Coming soon)*

1 hour or 1 ½ hour workshop plan. This workshop is aimed at adult literacy and Essential Skills students. It introduces the kit by getting participants to try out an example of each type of activity.
